Understanding the Importance of Daily Attendance

School attendance is important because it underscores the significance of learning and the importance of obtaining an education. It also helps students develop good work habits that will carry over in life. There is a strong relationship between good attendance and improved grades and health. The responsibility of fostering good attendance starts with parents.

Attendance Definitions

Truant- Any child subject to compulsory attendance who during the school calendar year has five days or more of unexcused absences.

Tardy- Students are considered tardy to school or class if the student arrives at a designated location after a school bell, chime, or buzzer has sounded.

Excused Absences-

- Personal illness, serious illness, or death in the student's immediate family
- Observing religious holidays
- Conditions rendering attendance impossible or hazardous to student health or safety
- Serving as pages for the Georgia General Assembly
- Court order or an order by a governing agency
- Visiting with a parent prior to or during leave from deployment to a combat zone or combat support posting
- Older students who are registering to vote or voting

Kindergarten AKS

LA-Compare & contrast different versions of fairy tales; listen to a variety of texts; use new vocabulary; discriminate between real & imaginary; write first & last name, words, & letters.

MATH-Write numerals from 1-20; identify coins by name & value; recognize & name a sphere & cube; identify, create, & extend patterns.

SCIENCE-Explore the forces that cause a change in motion; sort objects according to their motion (straight, zigzag, fast, slow, etc).

SOCIAL STUDIES- Identify the purpose of Columbus Day; use words & phrases related to chronology and time to explain how things changed in relation to Columbus Day; describe customs and family celebrations related to Columbus Day.

First Grade AKS

LA: Reading-Follow three part directions; identify the purpose of the exclamation mark & apostrophe; identify antonyms and verbs.

Writing-Write a clear beginning, middle, and end for a story; focus on narrative and informational writing.

MATH-Place value; addition and subtraction facts; telling time to the hour and half-hour; recognize shapes such as cone, sphere, cube, etc.

SCIENCE-Discuss natural resources: conservation/pollution, characteristics and needs of living things.

SOCIAL STUDIES-Describe how Thomas Jefferson, Lewis & Clark, Sacagawea displayed positive character traits, commitment, and respect for others.

Second Grade AKS

LA-Write & recognize regular, irregular plurals & possessive, silent letters, & linking verbs (is, are, was, were). Distinguish between exclamatory & imperative sentences. Identify homophones. Write friendly letters.

MATH-Create & interpret bar and picture graphs, and Venn diagrams. Tell time (to 5 min) & temperature. Compare fractions: thirds, sixths, eights, and tenths.

SCIENCE-Identify states of matter (solids, liquids, & gases). Recognize & compare physical properties of matter. Identify chemical changes in matter (burning paper, toasting bread).

SOCIAL STUDIES-Describe the lives of the GA Creek & Cherokee culture. Define concept of government & need for rules & laws. Explain how money is used to obtain goods & services.

Third Grade AKS

LA: Reading-Identify explicit and implicit information; summarize important ideas in informational text; locate information within the title, table of contents, & chapter headings; distinguish between synonyms, antonyms, homophones, and homographs. **Writing-Write** an informational piece using facts, supporting details and examples.

MATH-Recognize & explain models of division; explain meaning of remainders; demonstrate equivalent relationships; classify triangles; identify polygons, compare angles, identify center, diameter, and radius.

SCIENCE -Compare & contrast rocks & minerals; determine their attributes (shape, color, texture); classify rocks (igneous, sedimentary, metamorphic); describe how wind and rain change rocks and soil over time.

SOCIAL STUDIES-Discuss Paul Revere & his efforts to expand people's rights and freedoms; describe the four types of productive resources; explain that government provides good and services in a market economy.

Fourth Grade AKS

LA: Reading-identify and use different types of nouns, pronouns (personal pronouns, antecedents), verbs (subject-verb agreement), adjectives, & adverbs; identify & analyze elements of plot, setting, theme, & character within texts, between texts, & in relation to self.

Writing-write a summary to demonstrate understanding of literary works to include main idea and significant details.

MATH-locate, name, & graph ordered pairs in the first quadrant of the coordinate system; determine & justify the range, mode, & median of a set of data; compare different graphical representations for a given set of data.

SCIENCE-analyze weather charts/maps & collect weather data to predict weather events & infer patterns and seasonal changes.

SOCIAL STUDIES-describe European exploration in North America; compare & contrast examples of cooperation & conflict between Europeans & Native Americans; describe colonial life in America as experienced by various people, including landowners, slaves, indentured servants & Native Americans.

Fifth Grade AKS

LA-distinguish between first & third person narratives, analyze elements of setting, characterization, and conflict in plot, analyze the author's purpose and point of view, use sensory details in writing .

MATH-explain the process of multiplication and division of whole numbers and decimals; multiply and divide with decimals; review use of multiples, factors, & divisibility rules.

SCIENCE-classify organisms to simplify the study of living things; explain why scientists use classification in the study of living things; demonstrate how animals are sorted into groups (invertebrates and vertebrates) and how vertebrates are further sorted into groups (fish, birds, amphibians, reptiles, and mammals).

SOCIAL STUDIES-analyze the effects of Reconstruction on American life; explain how our rights are protected under the Constitution; explain the process of how amendments are made.

Coaches Corner: Betsy Gresh, Literacy Coordinator and Coach K-5**Lighting the Way for Literacy**

Jake, our Britt star puppet sings, “Come together right now...Read with Me!” every afternoon to signal a 15 minute daily “Drop Everything, and Read” program called “**BRITT TIME**”- the acronym which stands for “**Britt Reads In Total Togetherness**”. From 3:00 until bus call, students participate in a short mini lesson via the school’s video system, and they are given the opportunity to read what they want to read. Students share what they’ve read and reflect through writing the next day sharing their reactions to the texts with others in our learning community. Kindergarten participates in this program after their lunch due to their end of the day specials.

One of our goals this year is to use this forum as a springboard to create a school-wide community of readers and writers who grow to love reading and writing. My personal belief is that every child will learn to love the written word if allowed to tap into their own reading explorations and reflections. Self selection is the key in the beginning of this process. Children grow to love reading if allowed to select what interests them. They will develop the skills of thinking about their reading which will develop comprehension, vocabulary, and the mechanics of literacy.

As we all know, writing and reading go hand in hand. We become better readers by writing, and we become better writers by reading. In this month’s column, I would like to explore how families can take advantage of writing experiences to move their children to higher levels of literacy.

- List writing is common in many families. Parents are always making shopping lists, invitation lists, and to-do lists. Written lists serve an important purpose in life – they help us remember things and get things done. Share your lists with your child and encourage them to make their own lists. Every day, ask your child to make a list of their activities for the day. Later in the evening, the list can be used for reflection. Determine if the list was realistic, and then write about what was accomplished in a personal journal.
- All of us are notorious note writers. Encourage your child to take notes as well. They can write short notes to family members or make observations of the things they encounter in their lives. A great place to take notes is in a small spiral notebook that can fit into a back pocket. Children can jot down their thoughts and observations – the taste of a chocolate chip cookies, feelings about saying good bye to a grandparent, the thrill of going to Six Flags, and so on. These notes can serve as inspirations and the source for more in-depth writing.
- Dialogue journals are written conversations between a parent and a child using a journal or notebook to carry on the conversation. The parent writes an entry into the journal – to ask a question, provide an answer, or give or take advice. Deliver the journal to your child’s room where he or she makes an entry the following day and returns the journal to the parent for the next entry. These journals are great ways for parents to develop a deeper relationship with their children. Encouragements, apologies, questions, and words of affection are perfect to share. Children will learn to share more of themselves with their parents.

Writing is important to the development of a fully literate person. It must be an authentic and a regular family routine in which the essential element is to communicate one’s thoughts and ideas. At Britt Elementary, we encourage our families to make writing an integral part of their family life. You will be glad you did!!
